Congratulations to the Fall 2023 AS Cohort! We are so proud of these new registered nurses.





The School of Nursing graduated 203 students in 2023: 99 AS, 21 pre-licensure BSN, 52 RN-BSN, 28 MSN, and 3 DNP degrees. The total number of graduates was up from 186 in 2022. God has blessed our graduates.

100% PASS RATE. The fall AS graduates achieved a 100% first-time pass rate on the NCLEX-RN. Their success was celebrated with a delicious homemade lunch. A financial reward is another benefit, if they tested within 90 days of graduation and had a "green light" predictor of success in their ATI study/review program.

MORE GOOD NEWS. We had 18 pre-licensure BSN students graduate in May 2024. All 18 have passed the

NCLEX-RN. This is the first pre-licensure BSN group to achieve a 100% pass rate for their cohort. Additionally, almost all the May 2024 AS graduates have taken and passed the NCLEX-RN too – so far, another 100%. We're on a great roll!

Graduate student success on Nurse Practitioner certification exams for graduates of December 2023 and May 2024 also stands at 100%

We have an outstanding faculty team who set students up for success. We are proud of our dedicated students who go out and make a difference in the world!

GIVING DAY SUCCESS

(MILLER HALL/SIMULATION LAB UPDATE)

Thank you to everyone who generously donated this year to the School of Nursing during Giving Day 2024. Of the \$36,212.06 in gifts and prizes from our campaign, \$13,422.06 was designated for general use in the Miller Hall simulation center project, and \$16,080.00 was donated to a named conference room in honor of former faculty and staff. FOND REMEMBRANCES

ary Roberts, '00 and '01, (1977-2024) was born in Kenya to missionary parents Bob (a pilot) and Jan Roberts (a nurse), Gary grew up in Zaire (now the Democratic Republic of Congo) immersed in mission work. Following in his father's footsteps, he obtained his pilot's license. When he arrived to Southern as a freshman in 1997, he met his future wife Wendy Byard, '01, in his first pre-nursing course, Anatomy & Physiology. Their paths would cross again in nursing classes where love blossomed. They graduated nursing together with their BSN degrees in 2001. And they even got engaged at a local airport before uniting their lives and pursuing mission service together.

Gary and Wendy served in Guyana for four years. Their family grew during this time to include their two children, first Kaleb, and shortly after leaving Guyana, their daughter Cherise. They then accepted God's call to Africa, spending nine months in Cameroon before moving to Chad. In Chad, Gary ran the new aviation program while Wendy set up a nutrition center

for malnourished babies. It was during their time in Chad that tragedy struck, and they buried their 4-year-old son Kaleb in 2009. Only five years later, in 2014, heartbreaking loss hit again when Gary's father died in a mission plane crash in Indonesia.

In the wake of deep loss, Gary, Wendy, and Cherise moved to Indonesia, where Gary stepped up to serve in his father's place for Adventist Aviation Indonesia for 10 years. He even flew the replacement mission plane over 10,000 miles to bring it to Indonesia. This was not the first or the last time that Gary would fly a plane thousands of miles to deliver it to a mission station. His daughter even got to accompany him on one of his recent transcontinental delivery flights.

Gary's countless mission stories will be shared with generations to come: from delivering a baby while flying a plane in Guyana, to airlifting a baby elephant when he served in Africa, to discovering a "Sabbath-keeping" dog in a remote village in Indonesia. Through his work across multiple continents, he repaired and maintained planes and supported countless villagers, missionaries, and medical workers with medical aid, supplies, transport, and encouragement. He is missed deeply by his family: his wife Wendy, daughter Cherise, mother Jan, brother Eric, sister Stephanie (14), and his extended family and many friends. He leaves a legacy of service — an example for all — of how God can work through one person who is dedicated to Him and willing to serve without hesitation.



Ina Longway, prior chair of the nursing department during the Southern Missionary College years from 1975 to 1981 passed away at the age of 99 on June 25, 2024. Born in Singapore to missionary parents, Gustavus and Norma Youngberg,

Ina grew up in the jungles of Southeast Asia. Observing her parents teach the local people about Jesus, agriculture, and healthy living, as well as seeing her parents minister to the sick and needy inspired Ina for her lifelong journey of teaching, providing nursing care, and leading.

Ina was an eager learner who received her BS degree in nursing from Loma Linda University, and then went on to get her master's and doctoral degrees in nursing (San Jose State University in California and University of Alabama, Birmingham, Alabama respectively). She taught nursing, held leadership positions in nursing education at several locations, and used her expertise as a nursing education consultant. Her last 15 years before retirement were spent helping establish graduate education including public health at the Adventist International Institute of Advanced Studies (AIIAS) in the Philippines.

In a served her church in many ways. She loved Pathfinders and youth. She housed students and provided financial support to many students. Her 99 years modeled our School of Nursing values of caring, connecting, and empowering.

MANCHESTER, KY

ver the last two semesters, Beckie Retzer, associate professor, and Andrew Richards, professor, have led students from the Population & Community Health Nursing course on a service trip to Manchester, Kentucky. They partnered with AdventHealth Manchester and Healthy Homes Initiative (HHI), which provides residents with comprehensive home assessment, repairs, and evaluations. Students observe and aid in each of HHI's three steps: complete home assessments



for issues, work on fixing problems and making needed repairs, and assist with completing home evaluations once the improvements are complete. Christianity is not embraced in many of the homes students visit, creating a ministry and witnessing opportunity. Students also conduct a health fair where they checked patients' height, weight, BMI, blood pressure, and more. Then, they work with each patient to improve their health. Such an experience gives student nurses a broader understanding of the communities they serve.

LIMA, PERU

🖪 ay 10, 2024, 12:30 a.m., found a group of university students gathering in the School of Nursing for a mission trip to Lima, Peru. Students included nursing, biology, theology, and music majors prepared to do four days of medical missions followed by ten days of evangelism. Each student was assigned to a church in the Lima area. Much preparation for these trips occurs here and at the mission site.

The trip is organized by the School of Religion Evangelism Resource Center, which has partnered with the School of Nursing for the past two years to include medical clinics and health education as part of one of their summer evangelism trips. This year, we went to Lima, Peru. We left in the early morning hours amidst tornado warnings and experienced significant flight delays; but God was good, getting us safely to our destination with all but one suitcase. We left the airport with our supplies; not one suitcase was checked. During the four days of clinic, students participated in registration processes, took vital signs, did lab tests (blood sugars and urine checks), assisted with translation for English-speaking providers, helped with procedures (freezing lesions, suturing, etc), directed patients through the clinic, and worked in the pharmacy dispensing vitamins and medications and providing patient education. We

were able to help more than 700 people during our clinics.

Sometimes, we wonder what good it does to provide a few weeks of medicine. That amount can be the perfect bridge to further resources. Coupled with the evangelism and our prayers, God is at work. He is working on the hearts of those who received our care, and attended the evangelistic meetings, and on the hearts of the students who sacrificed to go on this trip.

Ming Wang, MD, PhD

FAITH AND SCIENCE HAVE COMMON GROUND

Ming Wang is a Christian philanthropist and world-renowned surgeon. Growing up in Hangzhou, China, Wang came to the United States in 1982 after securing a teaching assistantship at the University of Maryland. He earned two doctoral degrees—one in laser physics and one in medicine—and graduated with highest honors from Harvard Medical School and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Wang invented the amniotic membrane contact lens, which holds two U.S. patents and has been used by tens of thousands of eye doctors in nearly every nation throughout the world to restore the eyesight of millions. Wang is co-founder of the nonprofit Common Ground Network, and the film "Sight" is based on his autobiography "From Darkness to Sight." He also founded the Wang Foundation for Sight Restoration, which has provided sight-restoring surgeries free of charge for patients from 40 states in the U.S. and 55 countries. Wang is passionate about another type of vision as well, helping others to see that science and faith are friends, not foes.
